A WORLD TURNED UPSIDE DOWN:

DEMOCRACY AND INCLUSION IN AN AGE OF INSECURITY



The 2025 edition of the International Democracy Day Brussels Conference (IDD Brussels) will gather prominent organizations and thought leaders to explore the intersection between democratic values, security, inclusion and global influence as a pressing issue for Europe and its partnerships across the globe.

Organized by the <u>International Institute for Democracy and Electoral Assistance (IDEA)</u>, <u>European Network of Political Foundations (ENoP)</u>, <u>European Endowment for Democracy (EED)</u>, <u>European Partnership for Democracy (EPD)</u>, and <u>Carnegie Europe</u>, this landmark event will take place on Thursday, 18 September (afternoon), and Friday, 19 September (morning). This year's edition will take place at two venues in Brussels: On 18 September, it will be held at the Renaissance Hotel (Rue du Parnasse 19), and on 19 September, at the European Economic and Social Committee (Rue Belliard 99–101).

As the conference marks its eleventh edition, the event promises to provide a platform for high-level discussions about Europe's democracy mission, with a focus on how inclusive democracy is integral to ensuring the European Union's security, stability, prosperity, partnerships and global influence.
